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Pyrolysis-GC/MS: a powerful tool for microplastics identification

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Background

Plastic pollution has gained a large interest in the scientific community because plastic particles are found in marine environments. Moreover, ingestion of microplastics (MP) particles (<5 mm) by numerous seafood products (bivalves and fishes) has been demonstrated. Consequently MPs can represent an emerging risk for human consumption of seafood products. However, only few studies performed the identification of plastic polymer from inorganic debris with reliable methods such as Fourrier Transform infared, Raman spectometry or Pyrolysis-GC/MS (Py-GC/MS).

Py-GC/MS has been recently used for microplastics identification and it has the advantge to be relevant to specifically identify plastics polymers and their additives.

The purpose of this work was 1) to develop a method using Py-GC/MS to identify multiple plastic polymers and 2) to apply this method on MP found in the environment.

Pyrolysis-GC/MS principle

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Obtention of a pyrogram (chromatogram after pyrolysis) and an associate mass spectrum

All fifteen families were succefully identified. Typical pyrograms and average mass spectrums of PA-6 (Fig 2), HDPE (Fig 3) and PP (Fig 4) are shown.

This first step allowed the creation of our own database in addition of the database provided by the supplier.

However, for PE and PS, this method is not able, for now, to discriminate the type of polymerization.

2. Polymer identification of plastics from the environment

Fifty microplastics collected on a local beach (France) were used to apply the polymer identification method using Py-GC/MS.

Polymer identification was successful for 98% (Fig 5) of the analyses. It appeared that PE

Identification of the sample using databases

Materials and methods

1. Pyrolysis of fifteen reference material

High and low density polyethylene (HDPE & LDPE), polypropylene (PP), expanded polystyrene (ePS), crosslinked polystyrene (PSXL), polystyrene (PS), poly(methylmethacrylate) (PMMA), polylaurylactam (PA-12), polycarprolactam (PA-6), polyethylene terephtalate (PET), polyurethane (PUR), polytetrafluoroethylene (PFTE), unplasticized polyvinyl chloride (uPVC), polycarbonate (PC) and cellulose acetate (CA)

Verification of the Py-GC/MS method Creation of a database

and PP were the more abundant polymer found (Fig 5).

Conclusion

Here, Pyrolysis-GC/MS was successfully used to identify microplastics found in the marine



environment and a database was created using fifteen type of plastic references. This polymer identification technique could be used in large monitoring program and to specifically identify microplastics found in seafood products.

Future work

Method to accurently identied microplastics fibers will be develop shortly and the current method will be tested to identify microplastics as smaller as possible.
