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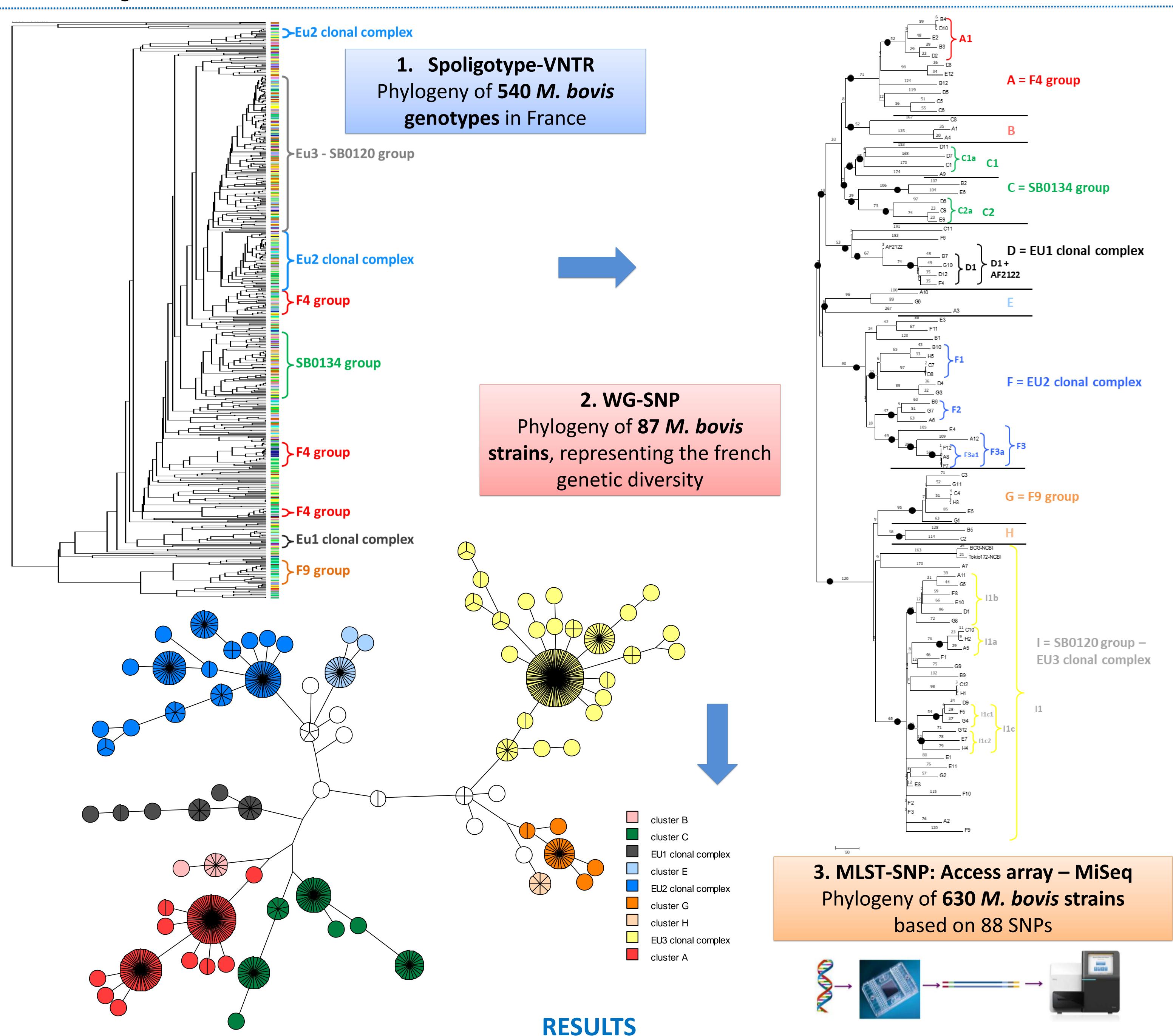
French Mycobacterium bovis Strains of Animal Origin



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CONTEXTE

Like other members of the Mycobacterium tuberculosis complex (MTBC), Mycobacterium bovis is highly clonal. After having employed the mildly discriminative spoligotyping and MLVA methods but also the highly resolving – albeit still not used in routine- NGS approaches, the objective of our study was to develop an easy and highly discriminative genotyping method for characterising M. bovis strains: MLST SNP.



- ⇒ panel of 630 strains from the French TB National Reference Laboratory (NRL) collection (1979-2018) isolated from cattle (92%), wildlife (wildboars, badgers, deer) (4%) and others (4%)
- \Rightarrow 6 dominant clonal groups were well identified : I Eu3 CC (n = 170), C (n = 94), Eu2 CC(n = 115), Eu1 CC (n = 24), A (n = 131) and G(n = 30)
- ⇒ the remaining three groups also well confirmed in the overall analysis

CONCLUSIONS

This SNP-MLST method is more resolutive than classical genotyping methods. It provides data to construct a robust phylogeny and give an overview of the diversity evolution avoiding WGS of a whole collection. Our data can be used to better understand the epidemiology of M. bovis in France by providing additional information on the different clonal groups, their variability and their maintenance over time.
