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A French study on the efficiency of sanitary shucking of scallops contaminated by the lipophilic toxins

Context

Following episodes of contamination of Pecten maximus and Aequipecten opercularis by okadaic acid lipophilic toxins (autumn 2014 in eastern Cotentin, Normandy, and summer 2016 in North West Cotentin respectively), the French National Reference Laboratory for Marine Biotoxins was commissioned by the General Directorate of Food of the Ministry of Agriculture, Agri-Food and Forestry to carry out a study on the distribution of these toxins in the shellfish.

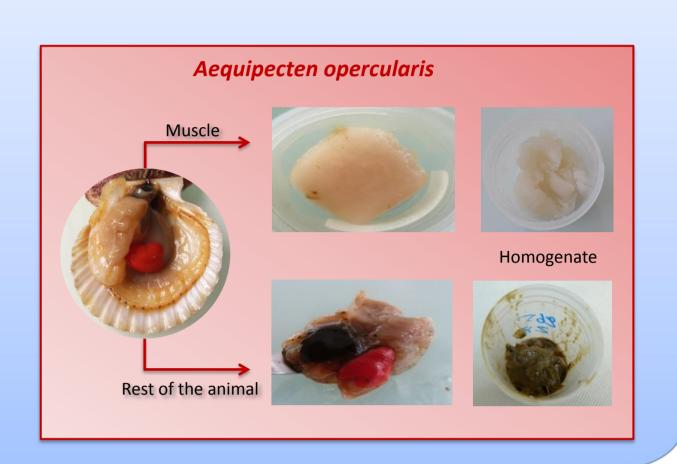
One hundred and thirty-nine individuals of *Pecten maximus*, harvested in 3 contaminated areas of the Baie-de-Seine, and one hundred and twenty individuals of *Aequipecten opercularis*, from two different lots, were analyzed for regulated lipophilic toxins (Regulation (EC) No. 853/2004) by liquid chromatography coupled with tandem mass spectrometry (LC-MS/MS). Analyses involved two different parts of each individual, namely "roe-on" (adductor muscle and gonad)/"roe-off" (adductor muscle only) and "rest of the animal".

The aim was to determine intra-batch inter-individuals variability on the one hand and the distribution of toxins between the scallops on the other. Results were evaluated statistically in order to assess the efficiency of sanitary shucking of scallops contaminated with okadaic acid and explore the market the 'muscle and gonad' only or the muscle only from Pecten and Aequipecten initially contaminated by DSP toxins.

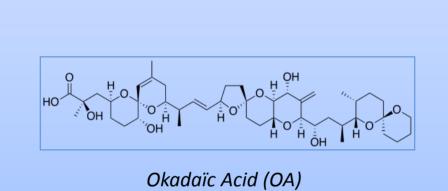

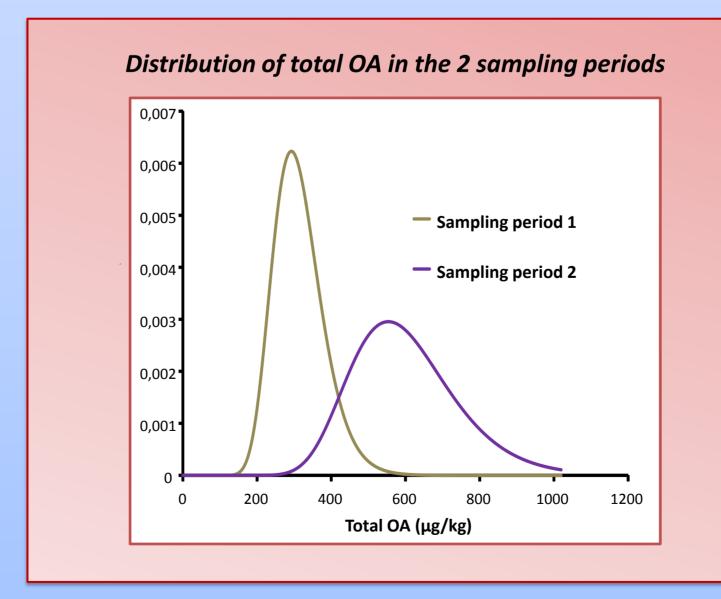

Conclusions

- > In this study, only okadaïc acid was measured in contaminated Pecten maximus, irrespective of the harvest area.
- > In Aequipecten opercularis, okadaïc acid and DTX2 were involved in the contamination.
- > In both cases, muscle or 'muscle & gonad' of contaminated scallops are toxin-free; OA group toxins are concentrated in the rest of the body (mainly in the digestive gland and to a lesser extent in the mantle).
- > Modelling implemented shows that for the contamination levels studied probability to exceed a value arbitrary fixed to the LOQ of the method is extremely low and probability to exceed the legal limit of 160 μg/kg is infinitesimally small thereby proving the efficiency of sanitary shucking of scallops contaminated by the lipophilic toxins.
