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ANALYSIS OF PLASMID-MEDIATED ESBL PRODUCTION AND COLISTIN RESISTANCE IN *Escherichia coli* FROM PIG **NOSTRILS: A NEW RESERVOIR OF CONCERN?**

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INTRODUCTION AND OBJECTIVES

Pig nostrils are frequent habitats of livestock-associated MRSA, but very few studies describe their role as a potential reservoir of ESBL-producing and/or colistin-resistant E. coli. Therefore, we aimed to investigate the presence of resistant *E. coli* in this niche, as well as their ability to spread depending on their chromosomal or plasmidic localization.

RESULTS


- ESBL-producing *E. coli* were recovered from 7 of 40 pigs tested (17.5%) but in none of the farmers, and the nine ESBL-E. coli isolates obtained were characterized as: bla_{CTX-M-} ₃₂/ST48-A (n=1), *bla*_{CTX-M-14}/ST117-F (n=2), *bla*_{SHV-12}/ST847-ST14914-B1 (n=2), *bla*_{CTX-M-14} ₁/ST5440-ST101-B1/ST93-A (n=3), and *bla*_{CTX-M-65}/ST10-B1 (n=1). All *bla*_{ESBL} genes were horizontally transferable by conjugation, through 40-200 kb plasmids of incompatibility group Incl1 (n=3), IncX1 (n=3) and IncHI2 (n=1) (Table 1).
- Incl1 plasmids displayed different genetic environments: i)IS26-blasHV-12-deoR-IS26; ii) wbuC-bla_{CTX-M-32}-ISKpn26 (IS5); and iii) IS930-bla_{CTX-M-14}-IS26. The IncHI2 plasmid presented the IS903-bla_{CTX-M-65}-fipA genetic environment, with multiple additional resistance genes associated to: i) Tn21-Tn5393-like transposon containing two atypical class 1 integrons; ii) a Tn 1721-like transposon displaying an atypical class 1 integron harbouring aadA2-arr3-cmlA5-bla_{OXA-10}-aadA24-dfrA14 and IS26-bla_{TEM-95}-tet(A)-lysRfloR-virD2-IS Vsa3-IS3075-IS26-qnrS1 genes; iii) a tellurite resistance module sharing full coverage-identity with plasmids previously reported in Enterobacterales (Figure 1). Other plasmids harbouring clinically relevant genes were detected, such as a ColE-type plasmid carrying the mcr-4.5 gene.
- Chromosomally-encoded genes (fosA7) or integrons (intl1-dfrA1-aadA1-qacE-sul1 or intl1-IS15-dfrA1-aadA2) were also identified. Finally, an IncY plasmid featuring a class 2 integron (intl2-dfrA1-sat2-aadA1-qacL-IS406-sul3) was detected, but not associated with a *bla*_{ESBL} gene.







CONCLUSIONS

✓ Pig nasal cavities are another important niche to consider that might favor the spread of ESBL-*E. coli* and *mcr*-mediated colistin-resistance. This situation would warrant closer monitoring, especially in a sector where close contact between animals in intensive farms increases the risk of antimicrobial resistance dissemination.
