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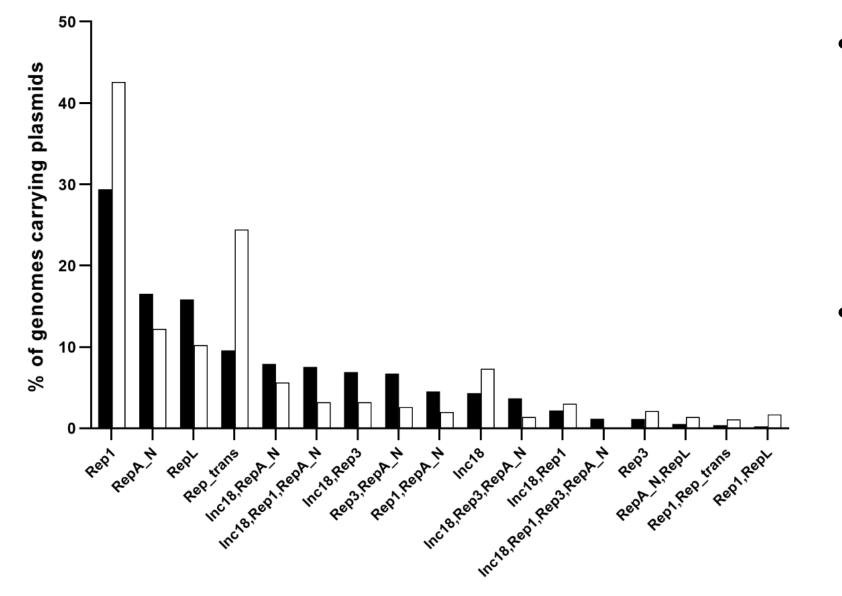
### Introduction

Staphylococcus aureus is a human and animal opportunistic pathogen that has demonstrated the capacity to develop resistance to a wide range of antibiotics. Its ability to acquire antibiotic resistance genes (ARGs) is closely associated with the large proportion of mobile genetic elements (MGEs) in its genome (between 15 to 20%) and its capacity to exchange genetic material with its environment. While plasmids have been shown to be key vectors for the dissemination of antibiotic resistance among Enterobacterales, their role in the spread of ARGs in *S. aureus* remains understudied. To address this gap, we identified the associations between plasmids and ARGs in 10,063 S. aureus genomes from humans and animals present in NCBI databases, along with 330 field strains collected by the French surveillance network in animals (Resapath).

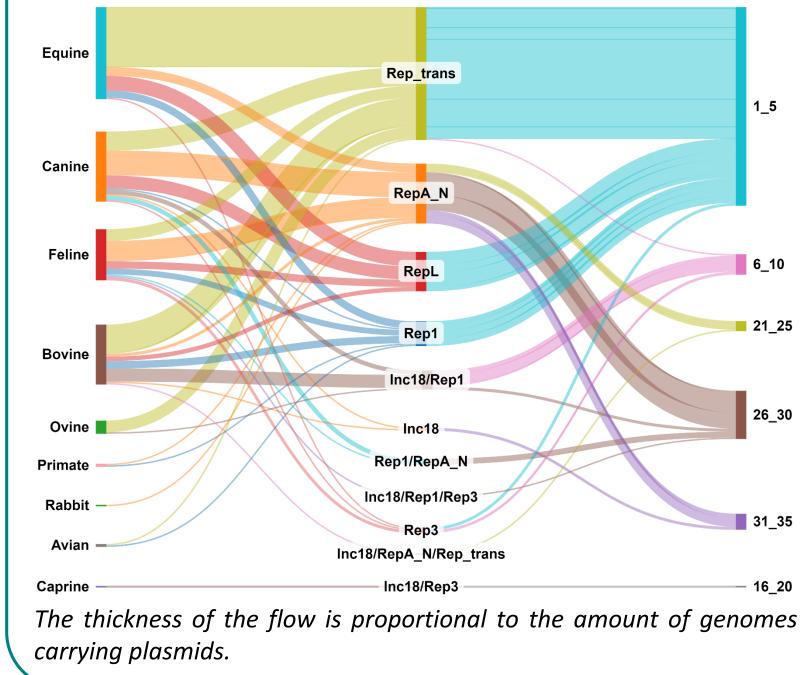

## **Diversity of plasmids in** *S. aureus*

#### In publicly available genomes,

- and 81% of S. aureus 86% genomes of human (Hm-SA) (An-SA) origin, animal and respectively carried at least one plasmid.

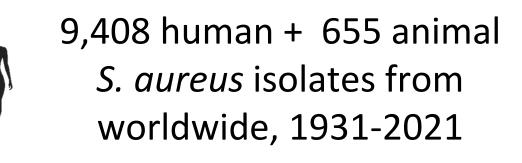
- An-SA: Rep1, Rep\_trans and RepA\_N

### In animal field strains,

**43%** (143/330) strains carried at least one plasmid.

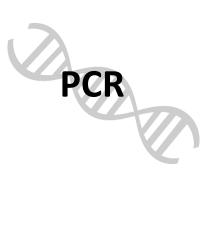

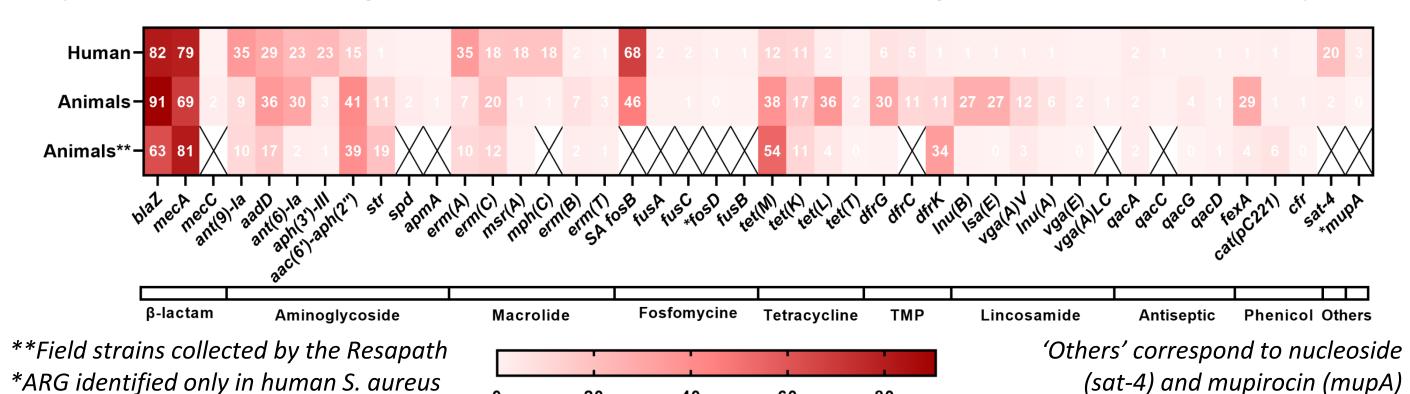
Sankey diagram depicting ARG/plasmid associations depending on ST in S. aureus of human (left) and animal (right) origin from the NCBI database

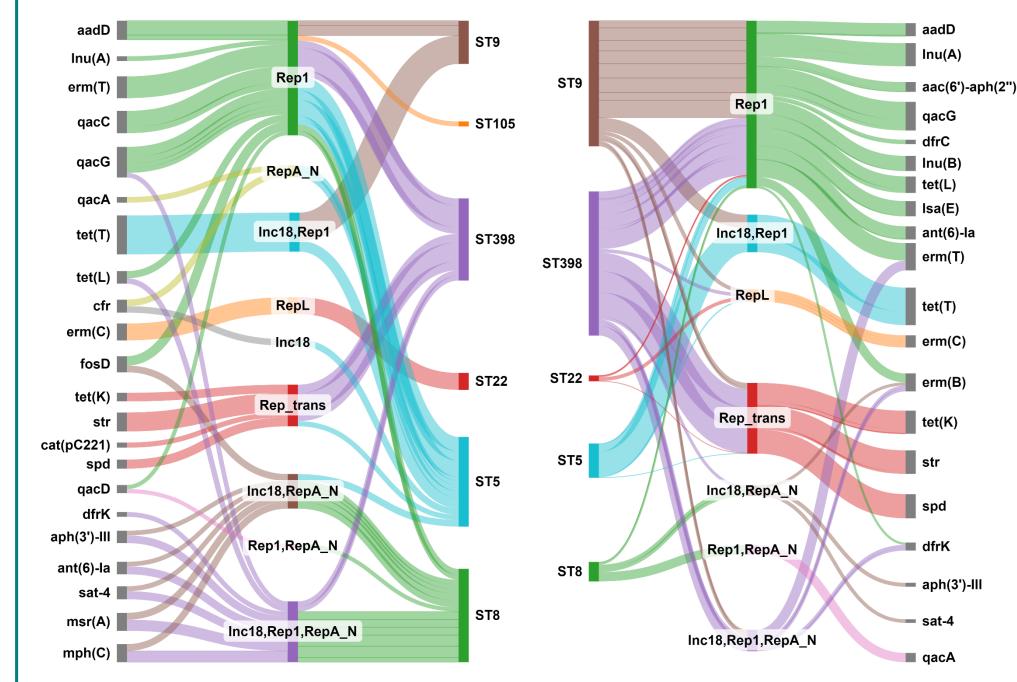
ARG = one plasmid family

- Multiple families of plasmids were found in all animal hosts.
- Widespread families: **Rep\_trans, RepA\_N** and **RepL**
- Average size: **small plasmids** (≤5kb)
- **Plasmid family = specific range** of size (except for RepA\_N).

### **Richness of antibiotic resistance genes in** *S. aureus*

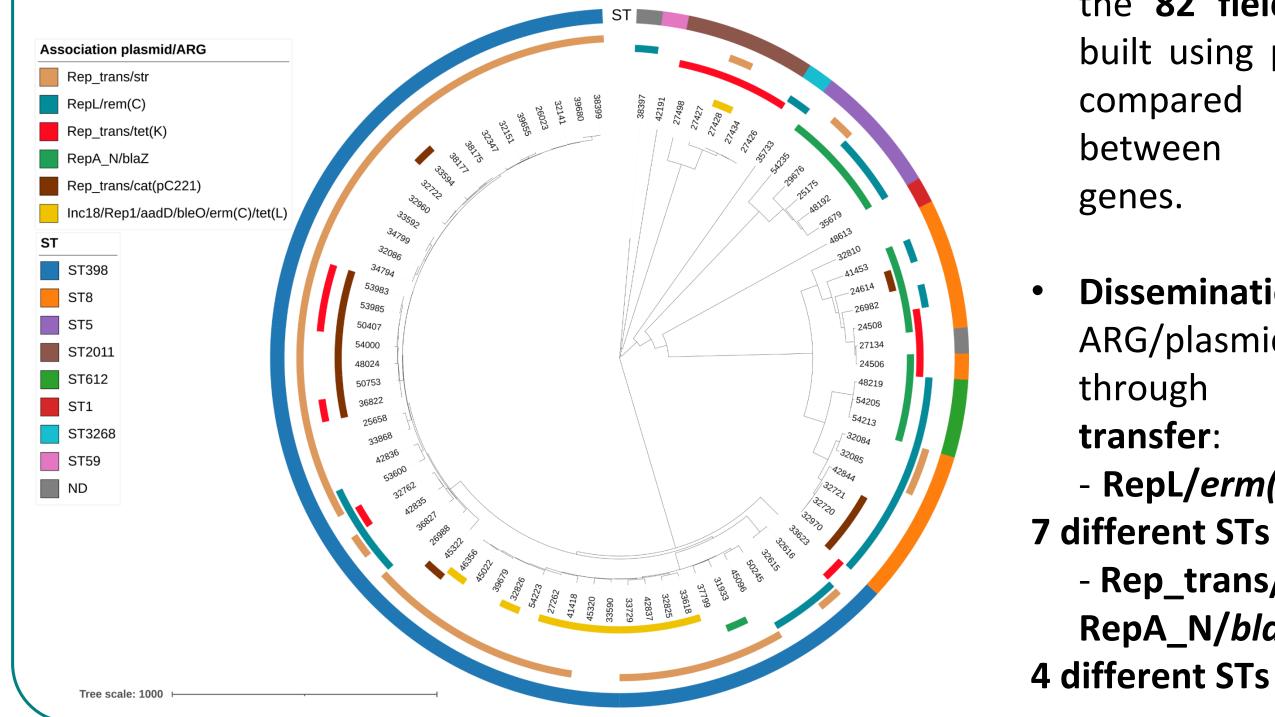
Repartition of resistance genes in *S. aureus* of human and animal origin and from NCBI and Resapath





The thickness of the flow is proportional to the amount of association.

- families Plasmid most associated with ARG:
- Rep1 in all S. aureus
- Inc18/Rep1/RepA\_N in Hm-SA
- **Rep\_trans** in An-SA
- Plasmid/ARG associations were found in multiple STs

 $\rightarrow$ **Dissemination** through horizontal transfer within S. aureus genomes.

- The phylogenetic tree of the **82 field strains** was built using pyMLST which compared the distance 1,861 core
- **Dissemination** of major ARG/plasmid associations

X : ARG not identified with PCR analysis

% of genomes with resistance genes

In publicly available genomes, only *S. aureus* with ARGs have been included in this study. However, in field strains, 92% of S. aureus (304/330) carried at least one ARG identified with PCR analysis.

The genes identified mostly conferred resistance to **beta-lactams and aminoglycosides** in all *S. aureus* and to **tetracyclines in An-SA**.

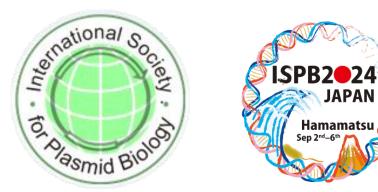

## Conclusion

This study highlights the remarkable abundance and diversity of plasmids, ARGs and plasmid/ARG associations within S. aureus genomes. While it is known that S. aureus disseminates through clonal waves, our results showed that ARG-carrying plasmids can also spread through horizontal transfer. Therefore, S. aureus plasmids promote the dissemination of resistance genes without host specificity and antibiotic specificity. These findings highlight the critical need to elucidate the mechanisms governing the epidemic success of plasmids in *S. aureus*.
